Albany residents can pick up free mulch at Ocean View Park; info here. Richmond residents can get free compost on first 9AM 4 PM first Wednesdays at 101 Pittsburg Ave., Richmond. This is also the West Contra Costa Hazardous Waste facility, where El Cerrito, Richmond, and other West County residents can drop off hazardous waste free.

Reducing greenhouse-gas emissions; climate change
